

#### THE OCEANS AND FISHERIES PARTNERSHIP (USAID OCEANS)


- Combats illegal, unreported, and unregulated (IUU) fishing and seafood fraud, promotes sustainable fisheries, and conserves marine biodiversity.




### Catch Documentation and Traceability (CDT) development:


- Analyzed proposed U.S. Regulations, EU Requirements, ACDS, and WWF data elements
- Identified "Ideal" Key Data Elements (KDEs) for inclusion in USAID Oceans' CDTS
- **Proposed KDEs** include:
  - Catch data
  - Vessel/gear information
  - Human welfare data points including sex-disaggregated data




#### Ecosystems Approach to Fisheries Management (EAFM)





 Oceans aims to consider gender in laws, policies and strategies arising from the project, and efforts will be taken to consider and understand gender and women's role and participation in the fisheries value chain in the development of technological procedures and tools.

#### **ENDGAME: THE BIG PICTURE**

By 2020, USAID Oceans will deliver:



A fully functioning **electronic CDT system/ACDS**, demonstrated at 2 learning sites (and implemented through the complete supply chain – from catch to import). CDT node integrated within national FIS.



**EAFM Plans** developed for Sulu Suluwesi and learning sites

**ACDS/CDT Guidelines** developed and applied (include Key Data Elements; CDT Electronic Architecture; Roadmap for Implementation)



Concrete **public-private partnerships**, with at least 8 partnerships formed and \$4 million leveraged from private sector



Incorporation of labor and gender considerations into CDTS to capture Key Data Elements, as appropriate for each country; & integration in other instruments/materials produced



TWG member network developed to support regional cooperation USAID OCEANS AND FISHERIES PARTNERSHIP
